1 POLICY

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Ridgewater College maintains an open-door admission policy, assesses students admitted, and provides
developmental coursework and other programs of assistance to support student success. Students must perform
at an acceptable academic level to continue enrollment and to receive financial aid. Students will be evaluated both
qualitatively (GPA) and quantitatively (completion percentage and maximum time frame). All periods of enrollment
will be included in the measurement of progress, including periods when the students do not receive financial aid.

89 I. Qualitative Measure of Progress (Grade Point Average)

- 10To earn a Certificate, Diploma or Associate Degree from Ridgewater College, a student must have a11cumulative Grade Point Average (GPA) of 2.0 or better in college-level courses. Accordingly, a 2.0 GPA is12the standard for all satisfactory academic progress.
- If a program or discipline has academic standard guidelines and procedures that are more stringent than
 the Ridgewater College Academic Suspension Guidelines and Procedures, the program/discipline
 guidelines supersede these guidelines and procedures.
- 18 II. Quantitative Measure of Progress (Completion Rate and Maximum Time Frame)

A) Required Completion Percentage

Students must earn 66.67% of the cumulative credits registered. The completion percentage will be calculated dividing the credits successfully completed by the credits attempted. Courses for which the student receives an *F*, *NC*, *W*, *I* and *FW* are treated as attempted but not successfully completed. See Grading Policy for definitions.

B) Maximum Timeframe

- Students may continue to receive financial aid through the number of credits required for the completion of a Ridgewater College degree/diploma/certificate multiplied by 150%. Students who have attempted over 75 semester credits should meet with their advisor to fill out an academic plan.
- Students who have double majors will be evaluated based on the required course work for both programs.

evaluated based on their current program of study requirements.

47 **PROCEDURES**

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49 Admissions

50 New or returning students are required to appeal their suspension only if they have an active suspension hold on

51 their account in our Student Information System from Ridgewater or another MinnState College. In addition, if a

52 suspended Ridgewater student is returning to Ridgewater and they have successfully completed 12+ transferable 53 credits at another Minnesota State or NON-Minnesota State College since their suspension, they do not need to

54 appeal. An official college transcript is required to determine that 12+ transferable credits have been completed

55 successfully.

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57 Evaluation Period

58 Students will be reviewed at the end of each term (fall, spring and summer). Faculty will submit grades to the

59 Registrar within 72 hours of the end of each term to allow enough time for progress to be evaluated. Reviews will

60 be completed prior to the 5th day of the academic term.

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62 Failure to Meet Standards

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64 Warning Status

65 If at the end of the evaluation period a student has a cumulative GPA of less than 2.0 and/or a completion 66 percentage below 66.67%, the student will be allowed to continue at Ridgewater College under a warning status for 67 one evaluation period. Students are strongly encouraged to meet with their advisor and/or counselor.

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Reinstatement of Students on Warning Status: If at the end of the warning period a student who has been on
 warning status has met Ridgewater College's cumulative qualitative and quantitative standards, the student will
 return to good academic standing.

73 Suspension

Suspension of Students on Warning Status: If at the end of the warning period a student who has been on warning
 status has not met Ridgewater College's cumulative qualitative and/or quantitative standards, they will be
 suspended immediately.

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78 Maximum Time-Frame Suspension

If at the end of the evaluation period a student has failed to meet Ridgewater College's standard for measurement of maximum timeframe, they shall be suspended from financial aid eligibility immediately upon completion of the evaluation.

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83 Suspension of Students for Extraordinary Circumstances

Students may be suspended from financial aid in the event of extenuating circumstances including, but not limited to, previously suspended (and reinstated) students whose academic performance falls below acceptable standards during a subsequent term of enrollment; students who register for courses, receive financial aid, and do not attend any classes; and students whose attendance patterns appear to abuse the receipt of financial aid.

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A student who has been placed on suspension status at another Minnesota State institution within the last five

90 years (at the point of application to the college) shall have that suspension in effect at Ridgewater College. A

91 student would have to follow the appeal process stated below to be considered for re-instatement.

92 Suspension for Inability to Meet Program Requirements within the Maximum Time Frame

93 If at the end of any evaluation period Ridgewater College determines that it is not possible for a student to raise 94 their GPA or course completion percentage to meet the standards before the student would reach the end of the 95 program for which they are receiving financial aid, they shall be suspended from financial aid eligibility immediately

96 upon completion of the evaluation.

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Appeals 99 Students who are suspended due to unsatisfactory academic progress (from this or any other Minnesota State institution) have the right to appeal based on an error of record or on extenuating/unusual circumstances. 100 101 Examples of extenuating circumstances that may be considered for an appeal include, but are not limited to, death 102 of a relative, illness, hospitalization, injury of the student or other unusual circumstances the student believes 103 should be given consideration. Students are notified in writing via their suspension letter that sitting out a period of 104 time in and of itself does not re-establish eligibility. The student must submit, as part of the appeal, documentation 105 regarding why the student failed to make satisfactory academic progress, and what has changed in the student's situation that would allow the student to demonstrate satisfactory academic progress at the end of the next 106 107 evaluation period. Students must provide proof of the extenuating circumstances in addition to a written

- 108 explanation, along with their Appeal Form.
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- 110 An appeal may be approved only if Ridgewater College:
 - Has determined that the student will be able to meet SAP cumulative (Pace and GPA) standards after the subsequent evaluation period; or
 - Has assigned to the student an academic plan that will require a term GPA standard of 2.50, and a term completion standard of 85.00%. This academic plan shall also determine the appropriate credit load and courses that the student may attempt.
- Students who have been suspended for not meeting SAP standards (at another Minnesota State college or university) that have successfully completed (at a 2.0 or higher GPA) 12 or more college-level transferable credits at an accredited college or university since that suspension are not required to complete the appeals process.

- We will analyze any submitted transcripts to determine whether or not the student would be allowed to re-enter on probation.
- Results of all appeals shall be communicated to students in writing and shall include the standards that the student is expected to meet and/or the academic plan that the student is expected to complete in order to retain eligibility.
- 126 Notifications of denied appeals shall describe the reason for the denial and the process for appealing the denial. 127
- 128 Students who are suspended from Ridgewater or who are suspended from another Minnesota State institution are
- required to meet with a college counselor to prepare an Academic Success Plan to be included with the appeal.
- 130 This meeting will review documents, make suggestions for a stronger appeal, and initiate an Academic Success
- 131 Plan to accompany the suspension appeal.
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- 133 All appeals will be initially considered by the Director of Financial Aid. Appeals of reinstatement denials may be
- 134 considered by an Appeals Committee which will meet at the end of each evaluation period and as needed

135 136 137 138	throughout the remainder of the year. The Chief Academic Officer will establish an Academic Suspension Appeals Committee that will consist of 1-2 Academic Deans, the Financial Aid Director, and the Registrar. The committee will also include 2-4 faculty (with representation from both campuses) as well as a counselor from each campus.
138 139 140 141 142	Students who have a grade change after the initial evaluation may also appeal for a new evaluation. Students who successfully appeal will be allowed to continue enrollment under their current status as deemed by the SAP guidelines.
143	Probation Status
144	A student who has successfully appealed will be placed on financial aid probation for one semester. If at the end of
145	the next semester (evaluation period), a student on probation status:
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147	a) has met the cumulative qualitative and pace standards, the student will be returned to good standing.
148	b) has failed to meet the cumulative qualitative and pace standards but have satisfied the conditions
149	specified in their academic plan, the student will be allowed to continue but will need to continue to
150	meet the conditions of their academic plan.
151	c) has failed to meet the cumulative qualitative and pace standards and failed to meet the conditions
152	specified in their academic plan, the student shall be suspended immediately.
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154	Notification
155	Students who fail to meet standards and are being placed on warning, probation or suspension prior to the start of
156	the next semester will be notified via email by the Registrar. Included with the notification of suspension will be an
157	Appeal Form as well as the date the appeal must be returned.
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159	<u>Reinstatement</u>
160	Students who have been suspended and wish to return to college (or who are currently suspended from any other
161	Minnesota State institution) and who feel as though they have mitigated their extenuating circumstances shall follow
162	the appeals process described above.
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164	Additional Elements
165	Students will not, for general purposes, be readmitted as probationary students for the summer semester.
166	Consideration will be granted to programs who only have summer starts and to other extenuating
167	circumstances.
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169	A. Treatment of Grades and Credits:
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171	<u>Completion Percentage</u> – The completion percentage will be calculated by dividing successfully completed
172	credits by attempted credits. Courses for which a student receives an <i>I</i> , <i>F</i> , <i>NC</i> , <i>W</i> or <i>FW</i> are considered not
173	successfully completed. In Progress <i>IP</i> and Audited <i>AU</i> courses are not counted in the calculation of completion percentage.
174 175	Grade Point Average – Grade point average (GPA) is the student's grade point total divided by the grade point
175	credit total. Each grade report shows the student's GPA for the term and cumulative GPA since admission. An
170	I, AU, P, NC, IP, FW or W does not carry a grade point value and, as such, is not calculated in the GPA.
178	i, no, i , ivo, ii , i vi or vi doos not carry a grade point value and, as such, is not calculated in the OFA.
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- 179 Incompletes - Credits for which an "l' is received are considered attempted credits but not successfully 180 completed credits for the purpose of monitoring satisfactory academic progress. Thus, an "*l*" does not impact GPA but does negatively impact the cumulative completion percentage. 181 182 183 Registered Credits - The total number of credits for which a student is officially enrolled at the end of the drop/add period each term. 184 185 186 B. Academic Amnesty: Ridgewater College does not offer academic amnesty. 187 188 C. Audited Courses: Audited courses will not be funded by financial aid and are not included in any satisfactory 189 academic progress measurements. 190 191 **D.** Consortium Credits: Credits for which financial aid is received under a consortium agreement shall be 192 recorded in the Student Data System to be included in cumulative GPA, pace percentage, and maximum 193 timeframe calculations. 194 E. Remedial/Developmental Courses: Credits awarded for course work with a course prefix below 1000. 195 196 Students may receive financial aid for developmental credits up to a maximum of 30 semester credits. 197 Developmental courses do not count toward graduation but will be included in the gualitative (GPA). Courses 198 taken Fall 2021 or later will be excluded from pace percentage measurement of satisfactory academic 199 progress. Up to 30 developmental credits shall be excluded from the maximum timeframe calculation. 200 201 F. Repeated Courses: A course may be repeated for an improved grade. A student will not be permitted to receive financial aid for more than one repetition of a previously passed course. Repeated courses are coded 202 203 automatically at the end of each semester. Only the higher grade will be counted toward graduation and in the 204 computation of the overall grade point average. All attempts are counted toward calculation of the overall 205 completion rate. An R will be entered on the transcript next to the initial grade to indicate the course was 206 repeated. The maximum number of credits that may be repeated is 18. A student may repeat a course no 207 more than two times. If a student wishes to satisfactorily repeat or complete a course for which they previously 208 earned an F or NC, the student must register for the course again. 209 G. Transfer Credits: Transfer credits accepted by Ridgewater College and applied to the student's program 210 requirements shall be counted as credits attempted for calculation of completion percentage. Grades 211 associated with these credits shall not be used in calculating cumulative GPA. Credits accepted in transfer and
- applied toward a student's general education or degree requirements shall apply towards maximum time frame
 evaluation.
- H. Withdrawals: Credits for which a *W* or *FW* are received are considered attempted credits but not successfully
 completed credits for the purpose of monitoring satisfactory academic progress. Thus, a *W* or *FW* does not
 impact GPA but does negatively impact the cumulative completion percentage. (Ridgewater College does not
 offer withdraw passing or failing grading options.)
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220 **Definitions**

- Academic Plan A student who successfully appeals for reinstatement may be required by an institution to complete, during a probationary period, specific requirements contained in an academic plan developed for that student by the institution.
- **Evaluation Period** Institutions shall measure Satisfactory Academic Progress at the end of each academic term or at the mid-point of programs less than one year in length.
- Suspension of Students on Warning Status A student on suspension status is not eligible to attend. Students who have been suspended may regain their eligibility only through the institution's appeal process or when they are again meeting the institution's satisfactory academic progress cumulative grade point average and completion percentage standards. Students suspended after spring term should contact the college counselor to appeal for fall. Appeals to be reinstated for summer will not be accepted unless there are specific program requirements for

- Maximum Time Frame The maximum number of cumulative attempted credits within which a student must
 complete his or her academic program.
- Probation Status A status under which a student who has successfully appealed a suspension shall regain his or her financial aid eligibility for one evaluation period, after which they must either have met the institution's cumulative GPA and completion percentage standards or have successfully completed the requirements of an academic plan developed for that student by the institution.
- 238 Qualitative Measure The Grade Point Average (GPA) a student must maintain in order to retain eligibility.
- Quantitative Measure The "Pace" at which a student must progress through his or her program in order to retain
 eligibility.
- Required Completion Percentage The percentage of cumulative attempted credits a student must successfully
 complete in order to retain eligibility.
- 243 **Warning Status** A status under which a student shall continue to retain her or his eligibility for one evaluation
- 244 period despite a determination that they have not met either an institution's grade point average standards, or 245 completion percentage standard or both.
